Ralph Waldo Emerson, famously said, "OUR GREATEST GLORY IS NOT IN NEVER FAILING, BUT IN RISING EVERY TIME WE FAIL".

- **He encourages** his readers to be honest in their relationships with others.
- Posts the effects of self-reliance: altering religious practices, encouraging Americans to stay home and develop their own culture, and focusing on individual rather than societal progress.
- Merriam-Webster defines self-reliance as 'Reliance on one's own efforts and abilities.' In broader contexts, self-reliance can be viewed as an individual's confidence in their capacity to manage their own life, make their own decisions, and provide for themselves without excessively depending on others. This concept is often celebrated in various cultures and philosophies for fostering independence, resilience, and personal growth" (www.emersoncentral.com, electronic source).
